From spring 2022 through spring 2023, people receiving services through the Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) will be able to purchase technology using a one-time Technology Fund. This fund will be a grant separate from an individual's current funding.

BHDDH Director Charest Reconfirmed

State Workforce Initiative (SWI) Summit

On January 31st, about 75 stakeholders attended the second State Workforce Summit at Rhode Island College. Stakeholders included individuals who self-direct and family members, DD agency providers, Direct Support Professionals (DSPs) with self-directed and agency-based employers, state agency representatives, and community partners. The goal of this summit was to build on and prioritize the areas and activities identified in December.

During the morning, state agencies and partner organizations including CPNRI and Skills for RI's Future provided high-level overviews of their ongoing workforce initiatives to give more context to the role of the State Workforce Initiative. During the afternoon small groups of participants discussed and ranked the priority areas identified during the December Summit. The input from this Summit will now go to the Coordinating Council to update the SWI Plan and direct the work for 2023. Preliminary planning for a June follow-up Summit is underway.

The goal of the SWI is to bring stakeholders together to address the DSP workforce shortage.

Caring Careers

The Rhode Island Executive Office of Health and Human Services (EOHHS), as part of ongoing efforts to support home and community-based services providers, launched a paid media campaign to generate awareness and promote jobs and upskilling opportunities for direct care workers. Beginning this week, the campaign will drive audiences to <u>CaringCareers.Rl.gov</u> to learn more about training and career opportunities here in Rhode Island. The campaign will run across social media, google search, streaming audio, and Google online banner advertising, and will also include targeted emails to the job seeking and job upskilling audiences in the region. The campaign will be live from mid-February into the summer months.

<u>CaringCareers.RI.gov</u> will direct job seekers to job search tools on the <u>EmployRI</u> and <u>Skills for</u> <u>Rhode Island's Future</u> job boards. If you work for an agency that currently has job openings for direct care workers, you are encouraged to post your jobs on these sites.

In addition, <u>CaringCareers.RI.gov</u> will provide links to continuing education, professional development, and advanced certification programs in Rhode Island, particularly at the Community College of Rhode Island, Rhode Island College, and University of Rhode Island. This includes a section for <u>career advancement for DSPs</u>.

While Direct Support Professionals (DSPs) are part of the Caring Careers effort, the State Workforce Initiative for DSPs will launch a more targeted campaign for DSPs in the coming months.

COVID Public Health Emergency Ending May 11

The COVID-19 public health emergency declaration will end on May 11.

What is the Public Health Emergency (PHE)?

The PHE was declared in 2020 by the federal government because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The PHE created a "continuous coverage requirement" for Medicaid. This means that people who receive Medicaid were not required to renew their eligibility, as they were required to do in the past to maintain coverage. Since the PHE was declared in 2020, the State has been working to protect benefits by not terminating Medicaid coverage (with just a few exceptions) and meet the needs of nearly a third of our residents who depend on Medicaid for their health care and DD services.

What happens to DD services when the PHE ends?

- Flexibilities for parents to serve as paid employees through self-direction will remain for 6 months after the PHE ends, until November 11, 2023. Rhode Island is working to make this permanent.
- Telehealth services will permanently remain. Telehealth is when a provider delivers services by smartphone or computer.

When is the PHE ending, and what does this mean for Medicaid members in Rhode Island?

When the PHE ends, RI Medicaid will be required to renew each member's eligibility prior to taking any action on a case. <u>Click here</u> to learn more about renewing your Medicaid or CHIP coverage.

The most important thing you can do right now is to **update your contact information** so that Rhode Island Medicaid can send you the notices and information you need to keep or transition your health insurance and your DD services, which are funded through the Medicaid waiver.

Access for All Abilities Mini Grants Deadline to Apply is Friday, March 31, 2023

The Paul V. Sherlock Center on Disabilities at Rhode Island College is soliciting applications from local businesses and organizations for the 2023 Access for All Abilities Mini Grant cycle. The Sherlock Center will award grants up to \$2,500 with the purpose of increasing access for people with disabilities to social, leisure, recreational, and/or cultural activities.

Businesses and organizations that engage the public in social, leisure, recreational, and/or cultural activities in Rhode Island, or primarily serving Rhode Island communities, are eligible to apply. Eligible entities include non-profit organizations, for-profit businesses, schools, and city or town government agencies. Applicants must demonstrate in their proposals sufficient resources to complete the proposed project within one year of receipt of the grant award.

Entities whose primary missions or client base is disability focused are not eligible for a grant award, however, they are encouraged to support eligible businesses and organizations to develop a proposal that meets the established criteria.

The Sherlock Center will prioritize applications submitted by eligible businesses or organizations (as defined above) that demonstrate a high degree of engagement with minority communities or diverse populations (e.g., veterans, refugees, L.G.B.T.Q.I.A+).

Each session provides 6.0 continuing education credits (18.0 total) for: physicians (AMA PRA category 1 CME), nurses (NE-MSD/ANCCC), certified therapeutic recreation specialists, registered yoga teachers, and some social workers and mental health counselors. Licensed occupational therapists may also receive professional development credits.

- 1. I love being my own "BOSS", meeting new people and spending my time working on something I really enjoy every day!

- 3. The Business Classes helped me to learn skills for problem solving, communication, marketing, and self-advocacy. I met other great people with disabilities who also own their own businesses. I also received a grant to buy the materials/supplies I needed for my business.
- 4. I have assistance through my personal support network, my Business Team and RIDDC who are there to help me with my business.
- 5. I am no longer *"volunteering*" my time at a job, but instead I have my own business making money and I now have an income!

The RI Developmental Disabilities Council (RIDDC), in partnership with CWE and others a FREE Business Development Series of 8 Classes, ONLINE through ZOOM Meetings. The first Class is **Tuesday, March 7, 2023 from 12:45 pm-2:30 pm** and others scheduled every week. We want to assist people to learn the right business skills and access resources to become profitable RI small business owners!

ALEXANDRIA, VA- The National Association of State Directors of Developmental Disabilities Services (NASDDDS) and the Human Services Research Institute (HSRI), are pleased to release the final NCI®-IDD State of the Workforce in 2021 Survey Report. Each year, National Core Indicators Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (NCI®-IDD), along with participating state developmental disabilities agencies, works with member states to implement the State of the Workforce Survey. The NCI-IDD State of the Workforce Survey collects comprehensive data on provider agencies and the Direct Support Professional (DSP) workforce providing direct supports to adults (age 18 and over) with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). The goal of the survey and the resulting data is to help states examine workforce challenges; identify areas for further investigation; benchmark their workforce data; measure improvements made through policy or programmatic changes; and, compare their state data to those of other states and the NCI-IDD average.

States across the country have used NCI-IDD State of the Workforce Survey data to demonstrate the critical nature of the DSP workforce crisis to legislators and policymakers. States are also engaging in deeper examinations of the data to determine the impetuses and drivers of workforce challenges. Advocates and researchers are analyzing the data to inform research into the workforce crisis and determine strategies to address the issues.

The release of the 2021 State of the Workforce Survey data marks a new opportunity for state developmental disabilities agencies, advocates, and researchers to work together to determine the best strategies to address the DSP workforce crisis. Moreover, data from the COVID-19 survey supplement can allow states to examine gaps and strengths in emergency responses and gain a better understanding of how providers experienced the pandemic. A total of 29 states including the District of Columbia administered the 2021 NCI-IDD State of the Workforce Survey. All told, data from 3,838 provider agencies are included in this report.
